He had a growing disposition for good, and he accumulated attributes of a developing personality all the days of his life. He seemed to be younger than I, and in traveling together people took me for being the elder of the two. I thought he would live longer, but he was taken down with gallstones. He died in a rest home on the west side of Salt Lake City not far from the Jordan River and North of the Fairgrounds. During his last days he remarked to me, 'Brother, I haven't any plans for the future,' and so it was true. When he was placed to rest, I offered the dedicational prayer.¹²
