Orson Clark: Science.

Interviewer: How long did you teach overall?

Orson Clark: Twenty-three years.

Interviewer: Did your salary go up very much?

Lucille Clark: It got up to \$3,000 before he quit.

Orson Clark: No, \$1,300.

Lucille Clark: Yes, you were getting around \$3,000 when you quit.

Orson Clark: Oh, yes that's right.

Ruth Knowlton: I would think that would be about right because Clark's first professorial job was an associate professor and they paid him \$4,000, for three quarters of course. That was 1952.
